Attributed to Azriel David Fastag, composed during the Shoah based on the text by Moses Maimonides (1138-1204)

Sung in Hebrew (English translation below)

I believe with complete faith In the coming of the Messiah And even though he may tarry Nonetheless I will wait for him

Context: *Ani Ma'amin* means "I believe" and it refers to the belief that one day the "messianic era" will come. It is based on one of the thirteen principles of Jewish faith according to Moses Maimonides, the tune is described as a somber melody, and it was written during the Holocaust (the composer unknown). According to popular legend, Reb Azriel David Fastag was divinely inspired to sing this song on a train headed to Treblinka. A fellow captive jumped out of the train and escaped, eventually teaching the tune to Modzitzer Rebbe, Rabbi Shaul Yedidya Elazar.

As we conclude tonight's program, we invite attendees to keep their candle as a reminder of this evening's program—and our shared commitment to being a community that stands against hatred and violence.
