





Number of First-Time, First-Year Students Enrolled













County of Origin for New Hampshire Residents


First-Time, First-Year Students





Total Number of Credit-Students with Number (& Percentage) of Part-Time Students











Number (& Percentage) of Matriculated Undergraduates by Gender


















Proposals Submitted - All Types







Individuals Involved in at Least One Award





Award Received All Types (Totals)






Intramural Sports Trend of headcounts of student participation in intramural sports.




