Administration for Children & Families	
The Administration for Children and Families (ACF) is a federal agency funding state, territory, local, and tribal organizations to provide family assistance (welfare), child support, child care, Head Start, child welfare, and other programs relating to children and families. The agency also has an active grant-making program for research. The agency is broken down into several arms, each with its own focus and grant-making programs.	Varies with program
American Academy of Religion	
To fulfill its commitment to advance research in religion, the AAR each year grants awards ranging from \$500 to \$5000 to support projects proposed by AAR members and selected by the AAR Research Grants Review Committee. These projects can be either collaborative or individual. These grants provide support for important aspects of research such as travel to archives and libraries, research assistance, field work, and released time. Grant awards range from \$500 to \$5000. Funds are not provided for dissertation research, publication expenses, nor travel to attend the AAR Annual Meeting.	August
American Association for the Advancement of Science	
Provides resource information on a variety of funding opportunities for women in science at both the national and international levels.	Varies by program
American Philosophical Society	
The American Philosophical Society maintains seven grant or fellowship programs in a wide range of fields. The Franklin, Lewis & Clark, Library Fellowship, and Phillips programs award small grants (\$1,000 to \$6,000) for modest research purposes. The Daland, John Hope Franklin, and Sabbatical Fellowship programs award much larger amounts (\$25,000 to \$50,000) in highly selective competitions.	Varies by program
American Sociological Association	
The ASA has several small grants programs to support innovative work in the discipline as well as funding for students and their involvement in the profession.	Varies by program
Asian Cultural Council	
The Asian Cultural Council is a foundation supporting cultural exchange in the visual and performing arts between the United States and Asia. Fellowships to individuals constitute the central feature of the ACC's grant program, the emphasis being on awards to artists, scholars and specialists from Asia for research, study and creative work in the United States. Some grants are also made to Americans pursuing similar activities in Asia and to educational and cultural institutions engaged in projects of special significance to Asian-American exchange. In addition, the Asian Cultural Council awards a small number of grants in support of regional exchange activities within Asia.	November

Dieman Foundation	
The Curtiss T. Brennan & Mary G. Brennan Foundation was established in 1988 to provide funding support for archaeological field research, emphasizing in particular those regions of the world in which early centers of complex culture or civilization originated. Support of active field archaeology, particularly excavation, is emphasized. Post-excavation analysis, processing and publication, or other archaeological activities supportive of field research will only be considered in connection with previously funded field projects. Earhart Foundation	
These grants are awarded upon direct application to individuals who have established themselves professionally. Such persons must be associated or affiliated with educational or research institutions. Fellowship Research Grants are intended to lead to the advancement of knowledge through teaching, lecturing, and publication. The emphasis is on such disciplines from the social sciences and the humanities as economics, international affairs, and government/politics, and philosophy. Grant Requirements and Instructions are available in the OSPR office.	Varies
Educational Foundation of America	
The EFA is a private foundation that provides grant funding in the areas of Health & Human Services, Education, Reproductive Rights, Democracy, Peace & Security, the Arts, and the Environment. In keeping with the legacy of Richard P. Ettinger, The Educational Foundation of America exists as an advocate for progressive change in our society.	Continuous, only 1 inquiry per year
Guggenheim Foundation	
The Harry Frank Guggenheim Foundation sponsors scholarly research on problems of violence, aggression and dominance. The Foundation provides both research grants to established scholars and dissertation fellows to graduate students during the dissertation-writing year.	August
Hayek Fund for Scholars	
The Hayek Fund for Scholars provides awards of up to \$1,000 to graduate students and faculty members for career-advancing activities. The award is open to graduate students who intend to pursue academic careers and untenured faculty members whose academic work contributes to the understanding of the principles, practices, and institutions necessary to a free society or to the understanding of the classical liberal or libertarian tradition. Hayek Fund awards are given for career-advancing activities including, but not limited to: Presentations at academic or professional conferences; Travel to academic job interviews (on campus or at professional/academic conferences); Travel to and research at archives or libraries. Please note: Hayek Fund awards are not given for conference attendance alone, funding will only be considered for individuals presenting a paper or interviewing for jobs at the conference.	Continuous

The Foundation aims to achieve its objectives through direct assistance to individual scholars who require small grants (\$3,000 - \$5,000) to further their research with emphasis on policy-oriented studies. NSF Sociology Program	
The Sociology Program supports basic research on all forms of human social organization societies, institutions, groups and demography and processes of individual and institutional change. The Program encourages theoretically focused empirical investigations aimed at improving the explanation of fundamental social processes. Included is research on organizations and organizational behavior, population dynamics, social movements, social groups, labor force participation, stratification and mobility, family, social networks, socialization, gender roles, and the sociology of science and technology. The Program supports both original data collections and secondary data analysis that use the full range of quantitative and qualitative methodological tools. Theoretically grounded projects that offer methodological innovations and improvements for data collection and analysis are also welcomed. The Sociology Program also funds doctoral dissertation research to defray direct costs associated with conducting research, for example, dataset acquisition, additional statistical or methodological training, meeting with scholars associated with original datasets, and fieldwork away from the student's home campus.
