

RESIDENTIAL FELLOWSHIPS

About Residential Fellowships:

- Provide an opportunity for faculty to take up residence in an intellectually supportive environment while pursuing significant scholarly projects.
- Often provide access to key materials (archives, collections) or a diverse set of scholars brought together in a single location for cross-pollination of ideas.
- Most require residence at the specified location (library, center, institute, etc.) for the duration of the fellowship period.
- Fellowships are typically one or two semesters long (coinciding with sabbatical leaves), but shorter term options are also common (e.g., one or two months). Consult sponsor websites for options.
- Although each program will vary, a typical award amount for a 9 or 12 month fellowship is around \$40,000—intended to pay for the faculty member's time.
- There are hundreds of residential fellowship options available each year—many more than can be listed here. Please contact OSPR for specialized searches for appropriate opportunities for your work.

American Academy of Arts and Sciences - Visiting Scholars Program	October
The purpose of the Visiting Scholars Program is to support the work of younger public policy analysts, humanists, and social scientists who show promise of becoming leaders in their field, especially those who work on multidisciplinary topics. The Program offers opportunities for them to carry out their individual research as well as to collaborate with Academy Fellows on shared scholarly or policy-related interests. It also helps to create a national network for scholars in the early stages of their career, assisting them in their research and professional development.	
American Antiquarian Society	Varies by program
The American Antiquarian Society offers three broad categories of visiting research fellowships, with tenures ranging from one to twelve months. All of the fellowships are designed to enable scholars, advanced graduate students, and others to spend an uninterrupted block of time doing research in the AAS library on their projects and discussing their work with others. The American Antiquarian Society (AAS) is an independent research library founded in 1812 in Worcester, Massachusetts. The library's collections document the life of America's people from the colonial era through the Civil War and Reconstruction. Collections include books, pamphlets, newspapers, periodicals, broadsides, manuscripts, music, graphic arts, and local histories.	
American Association for Advancement of Science - AAAS Science & Technology Policy Fellowships	December
AAAS offers fellowships in six programmatic areas: Congressional, Diplomacy, Defense & Global Security, Health, Education, & Human Services, Energy, Environment, & Natural Resources, Roger Revelle Global Stewardship. The Fellowships help to establish and nurture critical links between federal decision-makers and scientific professionals to support public policy that benefits the wellbeing of the nation and the planet. The Fellowships are designed to: (1) educate scientists and engineers on the intricacies of federal	

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policymaking; (2) provide scientific expertise and analysis to support decision-makers confronting increasingly complex scientific and technical issues; (3) foster positive exchange between scientists and policymakers; (4) empower scientists and engineers to conduct policy-relevant research that addresses challenges facing society; and (5) increase the involvement and visibility of scientists and engineers in the	
public policy realm.	
American Council of Learned Societies (ACLS) - ACLS/New York Public Library Fellowships	October
ACLS and the New York Public Library offer a collaborative program to provide up to five residential fellowships at the Library's Dorothy and Lewis B. Cullman Center for Scholars and Writers. The Center provides opportunities for up to 15 Fellows to explore and use the collections of the NYPL Humanities and Social Sciences Library. The Center also serves as a forum for the exchange of ideas among Fellows, invited guests, the wider academic and cultural communities, and the interested public. It provides individual office space and common areas in the Library building for its Fellows. Fellows are required to participate in Center activities. These may include daily lunches, readings, lectures, colloquia, symposia, and conferences. Each Fellow will also be required to offer a public presentation—a paper, a lecture—of publishable quality. American Council of Learned Societies (ACLS) - American Research in the Humanities in the People's Republic of China	November
This program is for scholars in the humanities to do research in China. US citizens and permanent residents who have lived in the United States continuously for at least three years prior to the application deadline are eligible to apply. This program supports individuals with the PhD or equivalent to do in-depth research on China or the Chinese portion of a comparative study. Grants are offered for 4 to 12 months of continuous research in China. Applicants should demonstrate that they have fully utilized the available resources in the United States and are prepared by virtue of study, training, and planning to take full advantage of an opportunity to do research in China. The program has been made possible by a grant from the National Endowment for the Humanities. Application materials for this program are currently being revised and will be available shortly in .pdf format; you will need the Adobe Acrobat Reader (available free of charge) if you do not already have it on your computer.	
American Council of Learned Societies (ACLS) - Frederick Burkhardt Residential Fellowships for Recently Tenured Scholars	October
ACLS invites applications for the ninth annual competition for the Frederick Burkhardt Residential Fellowships for Recently Tenured Scholars. These fellowships support long-term, unusually ambitious projects in the humanities and related social sciences. The ultimate goal of the project should be a major piece of scholarly work by the applicant that will take the form of a monograph or other equally substantial form of scholarship. ACLS does not fund creative work (e.g., novels or films), textbooks, straightforward translation, or pedagogical projects. Burkhardt Fellowships are intended to support an academic year (normally nine months) of residence at any one of the national residential research centers participating in the program. American Institute for Economic Research - Research Fellowship Program	March
Applications are invited for Visiting Research Fellows to spend all or part of the summer at the American Institute for Economic Research, located in the scenic Berkshire Hills of western Massachusetts. The field of research is open, but we especially welcome applicants who are interested in money, banking and credit; public and personal finance; economic and monetary history; the role of government in society; the methodology of economics; and the role of individual freedom, private property, and free enterprise in economic progress.	
American Philosophical Society (APS) - APS Library Resident Research Fellowships	March
The American Philosophical Society Library offers short-term residential fellowships for conducting	

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research in its collections. The Society's Library, located near Independence Hall in Philadelphia, is a leading international center for research in the history of American science and technology and its European roots, as well as early American history and culture. The Library houses over 8 million manuscripts, 250,000 volumes and bound periodicals, and thousands of maps and prints. Outstanding historical collections and subject areas include the papers of Benjamin Franklin; the American Revolution; 18th and 19th-century natural history; western scientific expeditions and travel including the journals of Lewis and Clark; polar exploration; the papers of Charles Willson Peale, his family and descendants; American Indian languages; anthropology including the papers of Franz Boas; the papers of Charles Darwin and his forerunners, colleagues, critics, and successors; history of genetics, eugenics, and evolution; history of biochemistry, physiology, and biophysics; 20th-century medical research; and history of physics. The Library does not hold materials on philosophy in the modern sense.	
Beineke Rare Book & Manuscript Library - Fellowships for Visiting Scholars	December
The Beinecke Rare Book & Manuscript Library offers short-term fellowships to support visiting scholars pursuing post-doctoral or equivalent research in its collections. Students enrolled in degree programs are ineligible. The fellowships pay for travel costs to and from New Haven and a living allowance of approximately \$3,800 per month, and are designed to provide access to the library for scholars who live outside the greater New Haven area. Normally granted for one month, fellowships must be taken up between September May. Recipients are expected to be in residence during the period of their award and are encouraged to participate in the activities of Yale University. Successful applicants normally explain in extensive and specific detail the relationship of the Beinecke collections to their project and its significance within the larger field of scholarly concern. Most of the holdings of the Beinecke Library in printed materials are described in Orbis, the online catalogue of Yale University Library. Early manuscripts and modern archives are described in detailed finding aids available via the internet. Books and manuscripts at Yale have been extensively described since 1926 in the Yale University Library Gazette, which is available in many libraries.	
Brown University - John Carter Brown LibraryFellowships	January
THE JOHN CARTER BROWN LIBRARY will award approximately thirty Research Fellowships for the year June 1, 2009 – June 30, 2010. Sponsorship of research at the John Carter Brown Library is reserved exclusively for scholars whose work is centered on the colonial history of the Americas, North and South, including all aspects of the European, African, and Native American involvement. Short term (2-4 months) and long term fellowships (5-9 months) are offered.	
Brown University - Pembroke Center for Teaching and Research on Women - Postdoctoral Fellowships	December
The Pembroke Center annually supports three or four postdoctoral research fellows in residence for an academic year. Candidates who do work that is qualitative and humanistic in nature are drawn from the humanities, the social sciences, and the life sciences. Fellows may not hold a tenured position in any college or university. The Center has an annual research focus.	
<u>Camargo Foundation</u> - The Camargo Foundation maintains a study center in Cassis, France, for the benefit of scholars who wish to pursue projects in the humanities and social sciences related to French and francophone cultures. The Foundation also sponsors creative projects by writers, visual artists, photographers, video artists, filmmakers, media artists and composers.	January
Center for Advanced Studies in the Behavioral Sciences	June
The CASBS at Stanford University offers a Residential Fellows program which awards academic year residential fellowships for 35 to 45 scholars who form a cohesive and diverse intellectual community. Fellows enjoy time and freedom to pursue their priority research, and more importantly, to expand their horizons in active engagement with their Center colleagues.	



Chiang Ching-Kuo Foundation for International Scholarly Exchange - Travel Grants and Visiting Fellowship	Multiple deadlines
The Foundation offers a limited number of travel grants to help fund travel for assistant, associate and full professors to present papers at conferences on subjects related to Chinese Studies. Applications for travel grants should be accompanied by a letter from the chairman of the department with which the applicant is affiliated. Travel grants, up to a maximum of \$1,000, are for travel and hotel costs not reimbursed by the conference organizer. Each university's department is limited to one application per year. Assistant/associate professors from the U.S. and Canada who have not conducted research in Taiwan may apply for a visiting fellowship to visit Taiwan for a short period of time to become acquainted with Taiwan's research facilities, including Academia Sinica, the Palace Museum and leading universities. The fellowship will include travel and living costs up to three months. The maximum amount for a three-month stay will be \$10,000. Shorter stays will be prorated.	Consult sponsor website.
College of William and MaryOmohundro Institute for Early American History and Culture	November
The Omohundro Institute of Early American History and Culture offers fellowships in the area of early American studies. The Institute's scope encompasses the history and cultures of North America's indigenous and immigrant peoples during the colonial, Revolutionary, and early national periods of the United States and the related histories of Canada, the Caribbean, Latin America, the British Isles, Europe, and Africa, from the sixteenth century to approximately 1815.	
Council for International Exchange of Scholars - Traditional Fulbright Scholar Program	August
Fulbright Scholar Programs offer U.S. faculty, administrators and professionals grants to lecture, do research or participate in seminars. The traditional Fulbright Scholar Program sends 800 U.S. faculty and professionals abroad each year. Grantees lecture and conduct research in a wide variety of academic and professional fields.	
Dumbarton Oaks Research Library and Collection	November
Dumbarton Oaks offers residential fellowships in three areas of study: Byzantine Studies (including related aspects of late Roman, early Christian, Western medieval, Slavic, and Near Eastern studies), Pre-Columbian Studies (of Mexico, Central America, and Andean South America), and Garden and Landscape Studies. Educational Testing Service (ETS) - Postdoctoral Fellowship Program	Fabruary

Up to three fellows are selected annually to conduct independent research in Princeton, N.J. A wide-variety of research is acceptable including: measurement theory, validity, natural language processing and computational linguistics, cognitive psychology, learning theory, linguistics, speech recognition and processing, teaching and classroom research, and statistics. The goals of the program are to provide research opportunities to individuals who hold a doctorate in the fields indicated above, and to increase the number of women and underrepresented minority professionals conducting research in educational measurement and related fields.	
Folger Shakespeare Library - Research Fellowships	November, March
The Folger Shakespeare Library offers research fellowships to encourage access to its exceptional collections and to encourage ongoing cross-disciplinary dialogue among scholars of the early modern period. Each year, scholars may compete for a limited number of long-term (six to nine months) and short-term (one to three months) fellowships. The fellowships are provided with funds from various sources, such as NEH, the Mellon Foundation, etc.

Getty Trust, J. Paul - Getty Scholars & Visiting Scholars	November
Getty Scholar and Visiting Scholar Grants provide a unique research experience. Recipients are in residence at the Getty Research Institute or the Getty Villa in Malibu where they pursue their own projects free from academic obligations, make use of Getty collections	
Hagley Museum and Library - Grants-in-Aid Program	March, June, October
Grants-in-aid: Short-term grants-in-aid support visits to Hagley for scholarly research in the imprint, manuscript, pictorial, and artifact collections. They are designed to assist researchers with travel and living expenses while using the research collections. Scholars receive a stipend, make use of the research holdings, and participate in the programs of the Center for the History of Business, Technology, and Society. These grants are to support serious scholarly work. They are available to both degree candidates and senior scholars and writers working independently as well as college and university teachers, librarians, archivists, museum curators, and scholars from fields other than humanities. Scholars are expected to participate in seminars which meet periodically, as well as attend noontime colloquia, lectures, and other public programs offered during their tenure.	
Harry Ransom Humanities Research Center	February
About 50 fellowships are awarded annually by the Ransom Center to support scholarly research projects in all areas of the humanities. Priority is given to proposals that concentrate on the Center's collections and that require substantial on-site use of them. The fellowships range from one month to two to four months, with stipends of \$3,000 per month. Also available are \$1,200 to \$1,700 travel stipends and dissertation fellowships with a \$1,500 stipend.

<u>Humboldt Foundation, Alexander von - Humboldt Research Fellowships for Experienced Researchers</u>	Continuous
Submit an application if you are a researcher from abroad with above average qualifications, completed your doctorate less than twelve years ago, already have your own research profile and are working at least at the level of Assistant Professor or Junior Research Group Leader or have a record of several years of independent academic work. A Humboldt Research Fellowship for experienced researchers allows you to carry out a long-term research project (6-18 months) you have selected yourself in cooperation with an academic host you have selected yourself at a research institution in Germany. The fellowship is flexible and can be divided up into as many as three stays within three years. Scientists and scholars of all nationalities and disciplines may apply to the Alexander von Humboldt Foundation directly at any time. The Humboldt Foundation grants approximately 600 Humboldt Research Fellowships for postdoctoral researchers and experienced researchers annually. Short-term study visits, participation in congresses and training courses cannot be financed.	
Huntington Library - Fellowships	December
The Huntington is an independent research center with holdings in British and American history, literature, art history, and the history of science and medicine. The Library collections range chronologically from the eleventh century to the present and include a half-million rare books, nearly six million manuscripts, 600,000 photographs, and a large ephemera collection, supported by a half-million reference works. Within the general fields listed above there are many areas of special strength, including: Middle Ages • Renaissance • Eighteenth Century • Nineteenth- and Twentieth-Century Literature • History of Science • British Drama • Colonial America • American Civil War • Western America • California. The Art Collections contain notable British and American paintings, fine prints, photographs, and an art reference library. In the library of the Botanical Gardens is a broad collection of reference works in botany, horticulture, and gardening.	
Institut Français de Washington	January
The mission of the Institut Francais de Washington is to promote, in North America, the study of French culture, language, history, society and French-American relations and to encourage the work of teachers, scholars, and students in these fields. The Institut also sponsors events to foster public understanding of French-American relations. The Institut provides funds for fellowships, prizes and conferences that serve this mission.	
Institute for Advanced Study	Varies
Each year, the Institute for Advanced Study selects approximately 190 Members from an average of more than 1,500 applicants. Members are selected by the Faculty of each School (see below), and come to the Institute for periods as short as one term or as long as several years. Young scholars and applicants from non-traditional backgrounds who have outstanding promise are considered, as are senior scholars whose reputations are already well established. The major consideration in the appointment process is the expectation that each Member's period of residence at the Institute will result in work of significance and originality. Many Members pursue research related to the special interests of one or more of the Faculty. In other instances, the research of Members is in areas not currently represented by a member of the Faculty.

The John W. Kluge Center	Varies
The John W. Kluge Center occupies inspirational and capacious study and meeting spaces within the Library's magnificently restored Thomas Jefferson Building. The John W. Kluge Center accommodates up to two dozen post-doctoral Fellows pursuing resident research, usually for periods from six to twelve months. Interdisciplinary and cross-cultural topics of a kind normally not encouraged in specialized departmental settings are welcome. Selection of a diverse group of Fellows is by various competitions. Post-doctoral Fellows have an opportunity to discuss their research with the Kluge Scholars and to explore possibilities for intellectual collaboration with other Fellows.	
Metropolitan Museum of Art - Fellowships	November
The Metropolitan Museum of Art offers annual resident fellowships in art history to qualified graduate students at the predoctoral level as well as to postdoctoral researchers. Projects should relate to the Museum's collection. The fields of research for art history candidates include Asian art, arts of Africa, Oceania and the Americas, antiquities, arms and armor, costumes, drawings, illuminated manuscripts, paintings, photographs, prints, sculpture, textiles, and Western art. Some art history fellowships for travel abroad are also available for students whose projects involve firsthand examination of paintings in major European collections.

National Humanities Center	October
The National Humanities Center offers 40 residential fellowships for advanced study in the humanities during the academic year. Applicants must hold doctorate or equivalent scholarly credentials. Young scholars as well as senior scholars are encouraged to apply, but they must have a record of publication, and recent Ph.D.s should be aware that the Center does not support the revision of a doctoral dissertation. In addition to scholars from all fields of the humanities, the Center accepts individuals from the natural and social sciences, the arts, the professions, and public life who are engaged in humanistic projects. The Center is also international and gladly accepts applications from scholars outside the United States. Most of the Center's fellowships are unrestricted. Several, however, are designated for particular areas of research. These include environmental studies and history; English literature; art history or visual culture; French history, literature, or culture; Asian Studies; and theology. Scholars interested in the impact of recent scientific research on the concept of the human are also encouraged to apply; see "Autonomy, Singularity, Creativity" on the Center's website.	
New York Public Library - The Dorothy and Lewis B. Cullman Center for Scholars and Writers - Fellowship Program	September
The Dorothy and Lewis B. Cullman Center for Scholars and Writers is an international fellowship program open to people whose work will benefit directly from access to the collections at the Humanities and Social Sciences Library – including academics, independent scholars, and creative writers (novelists, playwrights, poets). The Center appoints 15 Fellows a year for a nine-month term at the Library, from September through May. In addition to working on their own projects, the Fellows engage in an ongoing exchange of ideas within the Center and in public forums throughout the Library.	



Newberry Library - Fellowships	Multiple
Fellowships at the Newberry Library provide assistance to researchers who wish to use our collections, but who cannot finance a visit on their own. Fellowships at the Newberry Library are of two types: short-term fellowships with terms of one week to two months and long-term fellowships of six to eleven months. Short-term fellowships are generally restricted to individuals from outside the metropolitan Chicago area and are primarily intended to assist researchers with a need to examine specific items in the Library's collection. Long-term fellowships are generally available without regard to an applicant's place of residence and are intended to support significant works of scholarship that draw on the Library's strengths. <u>Playwrights' Center - Jerome Fellowships</u>	September
The Playwrights' Center is one of the largest sources of career-advancing financial assistance for playwrights in the country today. In fact, the amount of funding the Center regrants—including support of theater artists—is second only to the National Endowment for the Arts. Five fellowships will be awarded for the coming year, providing emerging American playwrights with funds and services to aid them in the development of their craft. Each fellow receives a stipend, and spends up to twelve months in residency in Minnesota using The Playwrights' Center's developmental services, including workshops and readings with professional actors, dramaturgs and directors. These fellowships are underwritten by a grant from the Jerome Foundation.

Smithsonian Institution Fellowship Program - Postdoctoral and Senior Fellowships	Varies
Fellowships at the Smithsonian Institution provide students and scholars with opportunities to pursue independent research projects in association with members of the Smithsonian professional research staff. Postdoctoral and Senior Fellowships - Postdoctoral Fellowships of three to twelve months are available for scholars who have held the doctoral degree or equivalent for fewer than seven years as of the application deadline. Senior Fellowships of three to twelve months are available for scholars who have held the doctoral degree or equivalent for more than seven years as of the application deadline. Applications for senior fellowships may be made up to eighteen months in advance. Stipends for senior fellowships are the same as for the postdoctoral program, but the Smithsonian's stipend may be matched by other sources of funding such as a sabbatical salary.	
Robert Penn Warren Center for the Humanities	January
The Warren Center hosts a year-long interdisciplinary faculty seminar organized around a selected annual theme. The fellowship pays a stipend of up to \$50,000 and provides \$2,000 in moving expenses.

SSRC fellowship and grant programs provide support and professional recognition to innovators within	

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fields, and especially to younger researchers whose work and ideas will have longer-term impact on society	
and scholarship. Although most programs target the social sciences, many are also open to applicants from

<u>United States Holocaust Memorial Museum - Center for Advanced Holocaust Studies</u>	November
The Center awards fellowships to support significant research and writing about the Holocaust. Awards are	
granted on a competitive basis. The Center welcomes proposals from scholars in all relevant disciplines	
including history, political science, literature, Jewish studies, philosophy, religion, psychology, comparative	
genocide studies, law and others. Visiting scholars at the Center have access to more than 38 million pages	
of Holocaust-related archival documentation; the Museum's extensive library; oral history, film, photo, art,	
artifacts, and memoir collections; and Holocaust survivor database.	-
Winterthur Museum, Garden, and Library - Winterthur Research Fellowships	January
We award approximately 15 short-term fellowships each year at \$1,500 per month. This is our most general	
category of fellowship, open to all candidates, including those in pursuit of a graduate degree, who can	
demonstrate a specific need for research in our collections. Applicants need not apply for a specific named	
fellowship, but we do designate certain awards as: Faith Andrews Fellowshipsfor the study of Shaker life
